The transition to electronic clinical information systems

The fact that we are entering the 21st century is not a surprise; but what it means to be contemporary sometimes does come as a surprise.

Hallmark Health is embarking upon a transition to electronic clinical information systems, which requires a transfer of practice from paper, handwriting, typing and telephone, to interactive, automatic computer-assisted record keeping, crosschecking of orders and verification of intent – fancy applications that provide an instantaneous safety evaluation of human recommendations. The intent is to make our hospital environment safer. The focus is on improving reliability for the patient.

Hallmark Health has made the decision to move forward with these initiatives. We have adopted computers into all aspects of our daily lives. It is time for us to adopt them into our efforts to improve patient care. In fact, we have no choice. Individuals might try to avoid them, but it is shoveling against the tide. More and more, the reimbursement of services is becoming contingent upon the implementation of electronic assistance; electronic medical records (EMR) in the office settings and computer assisted practitioner order entry (CPOE) in the hospitals. Nursing documentation, automated variance reporting and other decision support applications add up to a huge investment of our limited resources into computer equipment, software, infrastructure and personnel. No one can say we aren't fully engaged in these contemporary activities.

Now, the hard part begins. As we roll out the CPOE implementation, every clinician will be tested. The training, the availability of equipment, the frustration of other clinicians will be in evidence. Our IS staff support will be present to offer encouragement, assistance and solutions. They have done a great job and will continue throughout the implementation. They see our future.

Many clinicians see value in our effort; in fact, more often than not, clinicians join us because of our commitment in adopting electronic systems. They are our future and the future is here. I am asking for everyone's support. Clinical chiefs, I expect to support and to offer guidance. Managers, I expect to work with one another, pay attention to breakdowns, to poorly prepared staff, to roadblocks and to sound an alert for assistance. Physicians who do not want to use the system are not required to do so at this time. In other facilities that have adopted CPOE, physicians who do not want to learn the new practices are encouraged to sign their admissions to hospitalists.

We are learning. We are doing. Bring an attitude of confidence and let's make this implementation successful. Thank you and let me know what you think about how adoption of electronic supports makes the Hallmark Health hospital environment safer for our patients.



Hallmark Health offering the latest in endoscopic procedures

Hallmark Health has recently added new diagnostic equipment and services to the endoscopy units at Lawrence Memorial Hospital of Medford and Melrose-Wakefield Hospital that have made them one of the most fully equipped and technologically advanced in the region. Each year, these units perform more than 15,000 endoscopic procedures.

Enrico Souto, MD, points out the latest advances in endoscopy available at MWH and LMH. "Much has changed in endoscopy in recent years. We are able to gain a very clear, detailed view of a patient's digestive tract. It is more precise than X-rays with minimal discomfort and we can remove suspect growths. The procedure also helps many patients avoid more complex surgery."

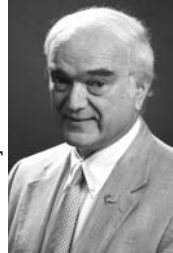

According to **Donna Begin, RN**, BSN, Clinical Practice Leader for the Endoscopy Unit at LMH, in addition to offering endoscopic ultrasound, the unit now offers single balloon enteroscopy procedures that can examine the small intestines, perform biopsies and remove lesions if necessary. The device is controlled by repeatedly inflating and deflating a single balloon by remote control to examine problem areas in the small bowel.

Endoscopic ultrasound has a wide range of uses in the evaluation, staging and diagnosis of almost all gastrointestinal malignancies. This technology is especially helpful in the evaluation of pancreatic diseases and has non-gastrointestinal indications, such as the evaluation of mediastinal lymph nodes and masses.

Ira Michaelson, MD, explains this new technology. "Balloon enteroscopes are a relatively new technique that allow for complete visualization and photography of the bowel. We can also do procedures, stop bleeding, biopsy suspicious areas or completely remove suspect tissue without having to resort to complex surgery."

Both LMH and MWH are equipped with high-definition television screens to help physicians diagnose more clearly diseases of the upper and lower gastrointestinal tract. High definition endoscopy combined with narrow band imaging allows physicians to see sharper images and better contrast which can lead to better detection of lesions and more accurate diagnoses.
